Current Practice

Meg is a principal and co-founder of Storrow Kinsella Associates Inc (SKA), Indianapolis, Indiana. As primary landscape architect for the firm her responsibilities include all aspects of client relations, planning and design of projects, construction document preparation, construction administration, construction observation, and post-construction review for quality control and sustainability evaluation.

Meg, together with co-founder and spouse John Kinsella, are principals-in-charge for problem-solving assignments that challenge them to find creative solutions that balance the built and natural environments in the creation of livable communities. Meg and John work closely together on all projects in concert with the studio team.

Representative SKA Projects

Indianapolis Downtown Cultural Trail: this work in progress is proposed as the first phase on the Indianapolis Regional Pedestrian System, and major step towards Indianapolis becoming a more walkable and bicycle-friendly city.

Indianapolis Regional Pedestrian Plan: is developing a systematic approach to pedestrian connectivity for the nine county planning region centered on Indianapolis and developing design guidelines for the public spaces of Indianapolis' core.

Indianapolis Special Neighborhood Study: SKA completed this prototype study for the Indianapolis MPO that examined a mile square area for potential pedestrian, bicycle and public transit integration.

Downtown Riverfront and Pigeon Creek Greenway, Evansville, Indiana, ongoing since 1993: development of the 40-mile Greenway Master Plan in 1994, then managing the acquisition, planning and design for consecutive phases of implementation.

Before the formation of SKA, Meg was an associate and project manager with Jack Curtis & Associates, and its predecessor firm, The Landplan Partnership, in Connecticut. In that position she was responsible for project management and site design for projects such as General Foods and Cummins Engine Company corporate headquarters; the Norwalk Waterfront Park and other urban park and recreational facilities; subdivision and landplanning; and conservation/wetland preservation. Prior to that experience, Meg worked for a Providence, Rhode Island engineering firm providing landplanning, site design, and landscape architecture services.
